Fighting Hunger During the COVID-19 Crisis

In recent months, many people in our community have experienced hunger for the first time. The COVID-19 pandemic has shuttered businesses, increased medical costs, and more.

WSCP has also faced big obstacles – including a growing need for meals at the same time as a decrease in food donations and a need to revamp our work due to COVID-19 guidelines.

- Revolutionized how we serve our neighbors, including starting drive-through food distributions

- Kicked off our online ordering program, making it faster and easier for our neighbors in need to put food on the table
- Opened an in-school pantry, helping students in a low-income neighborhood get the nutrients to be able to learn and grow

You're Helping Us Feed Struggling Families


In the words of a person we serve:

WSCP's caring volunteers made a big difference in 2020. They showed incredible flexibility and ingenuity when the pandemic hit.


Thanks to their support, we were able to evaluate our operations and determine how to safely meet the growing need for food assistance.

We are deeply grateful for our hard-working volunteers and look forward to seeing more of you again face-to-face in the coming months.


602 volunteers donated
