Dear Friends,

Since 1992, West Suburban Community Pantry has been a trusted resource to families in DuPage and Will counties helping to fill their meal gaps. In FY2025, WSCP once again delivered – with compassion, dignity, and an abundance of fresh, nutritious food. WSCP also provided access to support services linking families to a variety of tools – from educational resources to wellness programs – on their pathway to stability.

Our community is the key to ensuring that we elevate those in need. This community of more than 3,000 volunteers, more than 2,400 donors, and a dedicated staff, converge to help families thrive by ensuring that neighbors have access to food and more.

In FY2025, WSCP attained significant milestones, distributing a record 3.9 million pounds of food, the equivalent of 3.2 million meals to an average of 1,000 families each week. We continued to enhance neighbors' customer experiences and operational efficiency of the in-person pantry and online market through timed shopping visits and pickups and through partnerships with DoorDash Delivery and Amazon Local.

This fiscal year, our support services team created opportunities for families to flourish in a variety of ways. Connecting neighbors to many free services including registering for vital programs geared toward low-income neighbors - from health care to utility bill reductions, art and cooking classes designed to give children expressive ways to learn about healthy outlets for their minds and bodies, senior fitness classes to support mobility and friendship, and seasonal events to foster a sense of community amongst families who often have limited resources to celebrate special holidays.

The Pantry is a six day a week operation. Three days a week we are open to serve neighbors with nutritious food and the other three days, our staff and volunteers are receiving food, stocking the shelves, and ensuring that we are offering the best variety of items that we can to neighbors in need.

**It takes a community, and we could not do what we do without you!**





## Our Neighbors: Michelle and Frankie

Michelle, a mom of two, including a 3-year old with food allergies and dietary restrictions, has intermittently relied on WSCP during challenging times to help fill her family's meal gaps. Michelle shared that finding food for her child can be expensive and hard to secure. The Pantry has helped Michelle close that gap. Frankie, Michelle's son, is gleeful when the Pantry has apples or applesauce available. **This moment brings joy to Michelle.**

Additionally, Frankie has participated in free activities for our youngest neighbors. From enjoying field trips to the zoo, to attending events, Frankie has been able to explore opportunities to have fun, learn, and receive essential resources and referrals when needed.

Michelle emphasized the kindness she has felt over the years during her visits to the Pantry. When asked what her favorite thing about the Pantry was, she noted that it was "how nice the people are. I'm always concerned with feeling like a burden. So, I like the fact that they're very welcoming and never act like it's a bad time or it's a problem. **They're just always open arms.**"

Michelle's story is one of thousands of families who turn to the Pantry in times of need and are met with compassion and kindness by our volunteers and staff.

## Our Donors and Volunteers: The D'Amico Family

In 2020, as Pete D'Amico's professional career was evolving, he began looking for a way to give back to his community and found West Suburban Community Pantry. His initial assignment was supporting remote food distribution, and now Pete is a volunteer driver handling weekly Food Rescue pick ups. With a career in logistics, Pete was quick to point out that **"There is no shortage of food; it is just a matter of how you move that food from one place to another to reach people who need it. As a volunteer, you are part counselor and part logistics expert."** With a deeply felt conviction to how food helps bring connection and fills a need, Pete also added, "Helping feed people is not a political issue, it is a human issue."

In time, Pete introduced his dad, Joe, to the Pantry. Joe was no stranger to helping people – especially those who needed food or who were impacted by homelessness. Joe's compassion reflects a legacy that was instilled in him by his parents.

Joe shared that his dad and mom, who worked for a local crank shaft manufacturer and at a spaghetti factory, respectively, always pointed out how blessed they were. Joe was blessed to have a leadership career in finance for a variety of clients and served as the President of Apollo Education Group which owns University of Phoenix. While in Arizona and volunteering at St. Mary's Food Bank, Joe became very interested in finding solutions to the challenges of those who were homeless or hungry. Joe purchased hundreds of flip-flops for neighbors experiencing homelessness after realizing they were walking all day on the hot pavement during the scorching summer months.

Over the past year, Joe has taken on a variety of volunteer roles at WSCP from lobby registration to answering phone calls at the help desk. Joe noted, "You are part counselor and part detective." Once he received a call from a woman in Philadelphia desperate to connect to a food pantry in her community. And while Joe was not sure how she ended up on the other end of the line, he patiently sought out solutions and even generously offered to pay for an Uber to deliver food to the woman in need.

As a testament to the blessings they believe have been given to them, Pete and Joe not only donate their time, but also financially donate to WSCP. In fact, Joe and his wife Kathy generously offer matching funds for donations received during the holiday season. Joe noted, **"Making a larger gift makes a greater difference. We see the good work that is happening at the Pantry and the difference it is making."**

WSCP remains grateful to Pete, Joe, and the entire D'Amico family for their thoughtfulness and their generous gifts that bring humanity to the work we do.

# Serving the Community

**Kylia notes that the Pantry gives her family access to meat and produce and provides them with healthy food options reducing her worries around the cost of groceries.**

In addition to shopping at the Pantry, Kylia has also been able to utilize a variety of WSCP's support services for herself, as well as her family. Kylia's grandchildren have benefitted from the educational programs that the Pantry offers to children. Kylia noted that in working with Nancy Chatterjee, WSCP's Support Services Coordinator, she has been met with kindness and emphasized how helpful Nancy has been in ensuring she gets the resources that she and her family may need.



## Sharing Excess

Paul Matsushima, Director of Pantry Operations, has the daunting task of keeping the shelves and coolers filled with a variety of nutritious foods. Last fiscal year, more than **40% of the food the Pantry distributed was fresh produce**. But keeping our shelves filled takes some maneuvering and at times requires the dubious task of sorting through a few bad apples.

Our shoppers are surprised and delighted to see a colorful array of produce including Hungarian red peppers, leafy green choy sum, or even gray squash (which can be used in place of zucchini). The Pantry is also happy to feature more familiar produce including bananas, oranges, and the average green pepper!

Thanks to a partnership with **Sharing Excess**, WSCP has been leading a local effort to secure fresh produce year-round. Each week, the Pantry secures at least one semi-truck, at no cost, from a variety of produce wholesalers, including Atom Banana and SunTerra. Last year, donations of produce topped over two million pounds from Sharing Excess and a variety of other food donors including Northern Illinois Food Bank.

WSCP serves as the Sharing Excess drop-off location in the western suburbs. Once produce is received, our volunteers parse fruits or vegetables that are not suitable for distribution. **Any overly ripe items are composted to further reduce landfill waste.**

**When WSCP receives more produce than can be distributed, Paul and his team activate a callout to a network of 30+ food pantries throughout DuPage, Will, Cook and Lake counties.** These agencies stop by the Pantry and pick up what they can use. **In FY2025, WSCP was able to redistribute nearly a half million pounds of fresh produce.** This redistribution model ensures that WSCP remains a good steward of the food donations we receive while collaborating with organizations who share our commitment to feeding our neighbors and reducing food waste on a larger scale.


By sharing excess, we built a model for a community that works together to solve hunger and provide lots of fresh produce options while continuing to be positive stewards of our food supply and the environment.




